Fort Worth Museum of Science and History presents Fossil ID Day on April 23

Fort Worth, TX – Have you ever found a rock or fossil and wondered what it was? Bring your fossil to the Fort Worth Museum of Science and History for Fossil ID Day on Saturday, April 23rd. Experts from the TCU School of Geology, Energy, and the Environment will be on-site to help guests identify unknown rocks or fossils and find how where the specimen came from, and how old it might be. Those who do not have an unidentified specimen to bring in can locate fossils “seeded” by the Museum in DinoDig.

Fossil ID takes place from 11am -2pm on April 23 and is part of All Systems Earth, a week of celebrating the environment.

All Systems Earth is a week-long festival that ends on April 23rd. Guests will visit with community partners to learn about topics like water conservation while trying exciting hands-on activities. Participate in examining predators and prey, discovering how new energy sources can change our planet, and saving fish from a polluted stream!
